Points of interest from the last meeting

Extract of newsworthy items from the minutes of the last meeting. Note: Some events/activities may have concluded or been modified as circumstances change.

1. Wind Farm

Secretary advised the meeting that *Lal Lal Wind Farm Project Update 6* was received from WestWind Energy on 3rd March 2010. Detailed design work is underway for the electrical connection to the National Electricity Grid. The Yendon section is a separate connection to the Elaine section. WestWind Energy has lodged a connection enquiry with Powercor Australia and will soon lodge a Connection Application with Powercor to enable further advance electrical design work to be undertaken.

2. Field Maintenance

The President thanked Richard Turner, Jeff Dowsley, Len Astbury and Graham Waterhouse for tidying up the field on the Thursday (11th March) before the VPA event. Richard organized the working bee with the members mentioned.

It was noted that the gas stove shut off valve was left on in the kitchen recently. Secretary is to make up a laminated sign to put on the entrance door alerting who ever closes up to make sure the gas is off.

3. Annual Display 2010

Matt Porter went through his checklist of items and made the following comments:

 - o) Five road signs will be available from the ones previously allocated to the Gordon area to put along the sections of road where our signage is sparse. Roger Carrigg made up 6 red arrows to stick on the signs to indicate "continue on".

VMAA News

• It has been brought to the attention of the VMAA that some clubs are staging "Club Events / Fly-Ins" in the belief that they are only intended for MAAA affiliated members. What they overlook is that they produce brochures to advertise their event which gets out into the public domain and therefore are advertising to the public.

A display permit is NOT required when:

- o The audience is limited to MAAA affiliated members. Ie. Members of an affiliated club.
- Uninvited bona fide visitors are present and the flying is conducted on an informal basis. (Effectively this happens every weekend at the field).
- Non affiliated members are invited to the club facilities with the sole purpose of promoting club membership by providing training and exposure to the flying of model aircraft.
- The event is a competition and NOT promoted as a display.
- Exhibitions involving only static display of model aircraft.
- State Field Purchase The purchase process is proceeding. The VMAA Secretary has sent off a letter of engagement to the Land Valuers, while the executive has decided that the President and Treasurer will be the signatories on all sale documents.
- VMAA Directory This is still being worked on with a draft issue to be printed shortly.
- VMAA DVD Library latest video listing will be in the soon to be released VMAA directory. More DVD's have been purchased.
- Safety Fingers have been caught in props at Croydon and Greensborough clubs while a modeller was hit in the hip & shoulder area by heli rotors at Mildura. It highlights that we all need to be safety conscious at all times. Ed.

- Flying Instructors Report The condition of the four trainer models and transmitters is deteriorating and new batteries are needed. It was decided by the Executive to purchase four sets of flying models (comprising airframe, engine, radio and buddy box) to the value of \$2000.
- Club Registration and Member Affiliation It was reported by the MAAA Vice President that there has been an incident where the insurance company went as far as requesting when the particular member paid his fees and also when the club registered with the State Association.

It is therefore strongly recommended that members pay their club fees on or before the due date.

- **State Field** The NFG (Northern Flying Group) has spent over \$4000 developing the E/W runway and pit areas and has requested financial assistance from the VMAA. After some discussion the VMAA Executive moved that the VMAA assist the NFG financially for development works to the value of \$3000.
- Executive Honorariums The Executive moved that as honorariums have not increased since 2006 they should be increased as follows:

Tips & Tricks

Airacobra for the Wagga WWII & Military Scale competition, I noticed that the Magnum 91FS had no compression. I removed the rocker cover and sure enough the exhaust valve was not closing properly. The valves and rocker arms were all free but the culprit was the valve lifter down on the cam shaft.

A couple of drops of after run oil did the trick. Holding finger pressure on top of the exhaust valve pushrod while turning over the prop freed it up after half a dozen or so turns. Initially I feared it may have been a broken valve spring. I run 50/50 synthetic/castor so I guess the castor is responsible for the sticky valve lifter.

The engine is installed upright, and the fuselage was stored upright for the 6 months since it last ran so presumably oil collects down at the base of the pushrods.

The model was then flown on Sunday April 18th and the motor ran faultlessly.

As usual we held a static display at Stockland Wendouree the day before our flying event. This is always a good opportunity to promote our sport/hobby to the public. We setup shortly after 8.00AM and ran through until 3.00PM.

Annual Display Day – 28th March by Glenn White

ue to the first Sunday in April falling on Easter
our open day was brought forward by one week
and once again we were not blessed with the best
of weather conditions. The weather several days either side

of our chosen day would have been much more suitable, but you go with what you get. Although we had a reasonable turnout of pilots, I think that the adverse weather forecast discouraged many making the trip to Ballarat. Putting on a display there is always the worry that pilots may not turn up but fortunately we have sufficient capable models/fliers within our club to put on a good show.



This was the first photo I took (10:35AM) as the display got underway. Matt welcomed the pilots and Max gave a safety briefing before we got underway at 10.00AM.

The forecast was for strong winds and rain. The wind was from the north but not as bad as forecast or as it had been in previous years. Fortunately the rain held off for most of the day and it was quite mild. (Checking the weather web site after the event revealed that we were confronted with 25km wind, gusting to 35km for most of the day – Ballarat Airport readings.)

Flying got underway around 10AM as the general public began arriving and continued through until 3.00 pm when the raffle was drawn. Max was running the flight line and Graeme (A1) was doing the commentary over the PA system. It was great to see so many of our club members pitching in with running the event. A special mention must go to Mat Werner who flew for most of the day putting on a nice flying display and also for flying the lolly dropper.

In all we had 25 pilots registered with 41 models but not all of them flew due to the weather conditions. There were probably twice that many models on static display. Dave Lacy managed to get a control model into the air and put on a good demonstration, there was also a helicopter flying. A turbine motor was fired up for the public to see and hear. Noel had his Bristol Bulldog out on display bringing a lot of interest, as did Gary Sunderland's Houdini. Another model of note was the large Bucker Jungmeister flown by Russell Aggett.



Dave Lacy put on a good demonstration of control line aerobatics which must have been challenging under the windy conditions. (I tried CL as a youngster but suffered the dreaded limp lines syndrome!)

Four of us Max, Nick, Henry Hutchinson (V.P.A.) and I (Glenn) flew a round of combat which always seems to be a crowd pleaser, Max was the only one to cut a streamer and all the models landed safely.

Peter Harrison flew his Saito 150 powered Gee Bee Y several times throughout the day entertaining the crowd with its speed and tight turns. Peter Evans had his Tucano in the air many times throughout the day enthralling the crowd doing aerobatics and high speed passes over the strip.



The crowd always enjoys combat but they were denied the spectacle of a mid-air collision and had to be content with a streamer cut.

Murri was in charge of the swap meet; he informed me that it was very popular with quite a few deals being done and some good bargains were snapped up.
