Goin's on at the Field Kitchen Reno

On Friday 9th December Graeme with help from wife Dianne, pulled the old cupboards out of the kitchen in preparation for fitting the new ones he has been working on at home.



Stove and sink cupboards/benchtop have been removed in preparation for installing the new unit.



The floor and ceiling mounted cupboards on the back wall have also been removed.

On Sunday 11th December Graeme was busy fitting the doors & handles after installing the floor mounted cupboards the day before (Saturday).



Graeme assembled the cupboards and prepared the benchtops at home. The benchtops involved gluing & trimming the Laminex then cutting out the holes to suit the sink and stove.



Getting ready to mount the overhead cupboard to the back wall just below the ceiling. (Interestingly the internal lining of the kitchen which is a site hut is sheet steel.)

On the Wednesday before Christmas a few of us were at the field. Glenn hooked up the gas line to the new stove so that is all working again. The same gas shutoff valve we had before has been refitted under the stove so that should be turned off before closing up for the day.

Most of the contents from the old cupboards which were stored in the back section have been put back in the new cupboards so work can continue in that area. There are a few holes that need covering prior to painting the walls, then the electrical wiring can be fitted in conduits mounted on the wall & ceiling. The wiring in the walls has been a problem since we drilled holes in the walls years ago cutting the wiring which resulted in short circuits which tripped the circuit breakers. So all the internal wiring is being discarded.

Hamilton Fun Fly & Swap Meet

The Hamilton Model Aircraft Club held their annual Fun Fly & Swap Meet over the weekend of 26th/27th November.

Once again our club was well represented in numbers although we didn't come home with any flying awards. The competition was pretty high in that regard when you have models like Garry Bergen's 1/3 scale Super Stearman powered by a 215cc 5 cylinder Moki radial and P47 Thunderbolt powered by a 250cc Moki radial. The P47 is probably around ¼ scale given that the full size was a large aircraft – much bigger than say a Spitfire. I spoke to Garry who is from the Constellation club in South Australia and he said he is building a 42% scale WACO YMF-5 which is at least a couple of feet longer in wingspan than the Super Stearman and the top wing significantly higher. That will certainly be worth seeing fly.

Glenn Orchard was flying a large Marchetti powered by a twin cylinder petrol engine, might have been a DA120 or something around that size. He flew it many times over the weekend in a very scale like manner performing manoeuvres suited to the aircraft type which going by what I have read must be fully aerobatic.

Not knowing much about the aircraft I did a Google search and found this info which looks like it matches Glenn's model. The SIAI-Marchetti SF.260 is an Italian light aircraft marketed as an aerobatics and military trainer. It was designed by Stelio Frati, originally for Aviamilano, which flew the first prototype of it on July 15, 1964. Actual production was undertaken when SIAI Marchetti purchased the design soon thereafter and continued with this firm until the company was bought by Aermacchi in 1997. The military versions are popular with smaller air forces, which can also arm it for use in the close-support role. There is also a Marchetti web site: http://www.siai-marchetti.nl/

There was some great flying to watch particularly Garry Bergen's P47. The sound of that 250cc 5 cylinder radial
