New Models seen at field

Alan Crisp bought an old Great Planes Piper Cub from the estate of the late Doug Rodgers and shoehorned in a 15cc petrol engine. It required a fair bit of clean up and some attention to the covering but other than that it is quite original.

Model flies very well and has plenty of power enabling Alan to put it through its paces.

I managed to get this shot on a slow pass over the field or maybe it was a landing approach. Most of the time the Cub is doing aerobatic manoeuvres.



The Cub looks very realistic and is a great performer.

Secretary Nigel had a new aerobatic trainer at the field on Sunday October 7th for its maiden flight which went extremely well. Nigel has provided a few technical details for interest.

- Model is made by Sebart, an ARF aerobatic trainer and is called a Stev S 30E.
- Wingspan 1570mm.
- Weighs in at 1.4kg without the 3S 3000mAh LiPo battery.
- Powered by an OS 3820-960 motor with a Castle ESC.
- Currently using a 14x7 propeller but this may not be the best option.
- Hitec metal geared 12g mini servos.

From memory there was a moderate northerly breeze but it didn't seem to bother the Stev S 30E given that it is a very light model. Certainly had plenty of power.



After about 3 or 4 minutes Nigel brought it in for a pretty good landing – just a couple of bounces.

nthony Mepstead test flew his new PC-9 on Sunday 21st October and had several flights during the day, following on from the first making minor trim adjustments along the way to improve flight performance.

The model is a Blackhawk with a wingspan of 1800mm and powered by an OS GT22 petrol engine. It is also fitted with retractable undercarriage.

We settled on Sunday 30th September a few days beforehand because the weather looked good and we would be assured of a good rollup of members.



I managed to get June and a few of the members to pose for an "official" photo.

As it turned out it was a great day – good weather, good rollup and excellent soup. June also got to see a couple of Graham's former models fly. Unfortunately I didn't manage to get a very good photo to convey the atmosphere because I was too busy getting in for my soup and scones. Didn't want to miss out!!!

Mower Troubles

The mowers have to work pretty hard for a couple of months of the year to keep the runways operational and also maintain the general appearance of the field and car park area.

Drive belts seem to be the main problem with both chewing out deck and drive belts. The cut grass when moist builds up under the deck, stalls the blades causing the belts to slip on the pulleys and burn out.

The John Deere has been the main problem though. We had a close look at it a couple of weeks ago (Sunday 14th October) after it broke a new deck belt. The back of the belt has been rubbing on the right hand side deck attachment support post. Adding to the problem, it has a fairly complex arrangement for the combined belt tensioner and drive pulleys and if unfamiliar with the deck the belt routing, the diagram is needed when fitting a new belt.

With the deck out from under the tractor we positioned the tensioner & drive pulleys in what was thought to be the

desired location, so the belt would clear the deck support post. This was achieved by tying the two pulley arms together against the tensioner spring loading.

Next we then fitted the deck back under the tractor and attempted to fit the drive belt from the engine pulley to the deck drive pulley. With the tensioner pulleys in what was a working position to clear the deck support post the correct size belt (53") was too long. This may be attributable to some wear in the pulleys so it was decided to swap a new 53" belt just purchased for a 52". Murri fitted the 52" belt the following Wednesday and that seems to work okay providing sufficient clearance between back of the belt and deck support post.

Frozen & Burst water pipes in toilet

This has been an ongoing saga for a while through the cold months where night time temperatures have fallen well below zero. The copper pipe even though lagged has continued to freeze, burst the copper and pulled out from olive connections allowing the tank to drain to empty.

It was decided to replace the copper pipe with simple garden hose which should (hopefully) tolerate water freezing over the cold nights. This job was done on Sunday 30th September but with little rain the tank didn't have enough water by our Fly-In day so we half-filled the tank by bucket from the kitchen tanks. This was done during the Saturday working bee to tidy up the field in preparation for the Fly-In the next day. At least it meant the wash taps could be used on the day. Fred was up the extension ladder while water buckets were passed to him to tip into the spouting.



All the copper pipe from the tank to taps has been replaced with garden hose.
